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Restoration of Paintings

For some time the condition of the paintings at either side of the altar has been a cause of concern. These pictures, "The Nativity" and "The Deposition from the Cross" (both attributed to Antonio Belluci, 1654-1721), depict the two best known events in Christ's mission, hence their prominent positions. This prominence also means that any degradation is likely to draw attention and it is very noticeable that there is whitened patch on the brow of Mary in "The Deposition from the Cross", as can be seen in the photograph. This also shows that there are other whitened patches and what appears to be a horizontal line about a quarter of the way down the photo.



These two paintings, and also the two behind the altar, "Christ Preaching" and "Moses Receives the Tablets" (both attributed to Louis Laguerre, 1663 - 1721) have been surveyed by a conservation specialist. The problems noted above are thought to be due to the discolouration of the pigment of


previous restoration and the deterioration of the mounting of the pictures. In fact the loss of pigment colour, which is the most obvious, seems to be the lesser of the two problems. The main problem is that all of the pictures suffer, to a greater or lesser extent, from a deterioration of the framing and from aging of the canvas which has resulted in sagging or rippling. There are also some tears that need to be repaired and previous patches that are coming away.

The paintings will be restored away from St Lawrence's and thus they will each be missing for several weeks. The restoration will concentrate on correcting the problems with the physical structure. Some retouching will be undertaken to reduce the effects of discolouration and cracking but the pictures will not come back looking radically different. Obviously the cost of the restoration will be considerable and we are looking to have some of this grant funded. The Friends of St Lawrence have also indicated that they will be able to support this endeavour.

Who Was St Lawrence?

Little is known of the life of St Lawrence. What is clear is that he was immensely popular with the Christians of Rome. He was one of the seven deacons of the Church of Rome and on 6th August 258, he became the senior ranking Church official, following the execution of Pope Sixtus II. His tenure of this position did not last long, as he was summoned for beheading on the 10th August, and was commanded to bring the riches of the church with him. Lawrence had already given away the church's wealth, and arrived with a crowd of the poor, blind, sick and crippled - which were the church's true riches.

St Lawrence was martyred on a griddle, and is reputed to have told his murderers to turn him over, as he was "done on that side". It is perhaps unsurprising that he is known as a patron saint of cooks and restaurateurs.
